Early on in my career I was in Stig of the Dump in the West End. Since then I've done lots of film and TV roles including playing opposite Paul Bettany and Stellan Skarsgard in the feature film Kiss Kiss (Bang Bang). I've also played Davros' dad in The Audio Adventures of Doctor Who, so my claim to fame is being able to say I'm the 'grandfather of the Daleks'.

I guess I'm primarily known a 'voice man' and this year I voiced 10 of the characters in the Aardman Animation's Shaun the Sheep Movie. Attending the premier for that was fun – the red carpet was actually green!

#### What do you like most about your work?

My working week can be so varied. I sometimes look back after doing voice overs, auditions, writing and developing, and think, what a week! Each calls on different skills and disciplines, and all are creative. I enjoy working and creating with so many different and talented people. I also love the reaction and interaction you get from a live audience with theatre.

It's an industry where rejection is inevitable, so it can be difficult to stay positive and proactive. Many times you just don't hear back after auditioning, and you have to learn to deal with this. The lack of financial security can
